


Cabanières' path: Roquefort-Montclarat

Follow in the footsteps of Cabanières, these peasant women workers employed by the Roquefort manufacturers for the maturing season. They used to go to work on foot, sometimes daily from Montclarat and the surrounding area.

During the production run, the Cabanières from Montclarat paced up and down each day the landscape overlooked by the Combalou mound. Then, they would come back to their high perched village in the evening. This route which secretly keeps the imprint of their footsteps offers you to hike in a rural environment that has a rich rural tradition.



Altimetric profile





In the early part of the last century, the Cabanières made this trip every day to get to work in Roquefort. Those who came from Mézac passed via Montclarat. You can read their stories in the points of interest section.

1. When you stand opposite the Tourist Office, head to the left and take the leftmost path (the one which runs along the toilets). Follow the trail for 200 m.
2. Turn left onto the path that goes downhill. Cross the road and carry on sloping down the track with the yellow marking.
3. When you reach the crossroads situated at the bottom of the valley, take a left towards Montclarat. At the road junction, turn to the right to cross the stream over the bridge.
4. Go up to the right of the building to traverse the level crossing at a place called Carcan. Then, get on the trail and carry on up to a road junction.
5. Turn to the right and stay on the road for 1 km. Slope down the path on your left to go to the spring, carry on this path to go back to the road and reach Montclarat.

Retrace your steps back to Roquefort

On your path...



Buissière (A)

A buissière is a path lined with boxwood hedges forming a narrow green corridor typical of the Causses, adapted to a harsh and contrasting climate. These dense double hedges once protected livestock from wind, winter snow, and summer heat, while preventing animals from straying.

Used by shepherds, local inhabitants, and carts alike, the buissière made travel easier between hamlets, pastures, sheepfolds, and water sources, bearing witness to traditional agricultural practices.

Today, the box tree moth, active from May to October, threatens these hedges by stripping them of their leaves. Although the caterpillars can be a nuisance for hikers, they are harmless.

Soulzon Menhir (B)

The Soulzon menhir is a large stone over three meters high, locally called a "menhir," even though it does not display all the usual characteristics of a traditional menhir. This type of standing stone dates back to the Bronze Age, and its exact role in the ancient landscape remains a subject of debate. Some believe it is simply a natural remnant of the Combalou, on which a cross may have been engraved during the Middle Ages, possibly to mark a territorial boundary. Others suggest it could be a prehistoric menhir that was Christianized, a common practice in the region. The two deeply carved crosses on its faces support this latter interpretation.
